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As I write this remark, I am filled with nostalgic memories of the journey thus far. As a criminal defense attorney, I have represented over a hundred cases with great enthusiasm for winning. It soon became evident that freedom was not the ultimate aspiration for individuals who had experienced incarceration. Surprisingly, many of them feared the prospect of freedom due to the uncertainty they might face during their reintegration into society. Sadly, a significant number of them find themselves back behind bars.

Through interactions with our beneficiaries, we have discerned that the socio-economic demographics of incarcerated individuals in Nigerian prisons predominantly consist of the young, poorly educated, and politically and economically disadvantaged groups. This realization has propelled our efforts in the last three years towards empowerment through education, prison library projects, vocational and life skills training, and robust reentry support.

As an organization, we firmly believe that the journey within the criminal justice system does not culminate with incarceration but extends to the successful return of affected individuals to society as better and reformed individuals. Statistically, it has been established that over 95% of incarcerated individuals eventually reintegrate into society. In light of this, we view rehabilitation not merely as a term but as an empowerment mechanism for equipping justice-impacted individuals with the necessary skills required for a successful post-release life.

Our organization is committed to addressing the shortcomings of the punitive nature of the criminal justice system. While offering legal assistance through our pro bono services, we aspire to provide comprehensive support in rehabilitation and ultimately successful reintegration.

Looking ahead, we anticipate extending our programs to more correctional facilities, broadening our support to incarcerated and formerly incarcerated persons, including young offenders in juvenile centers. In alignment with our advocacy for a holistic criminal justice system, we aspire to collaborate with other stakeholders to ensure that rehabilitation and reentry support take a central position in criminal justice deliberations. Additionally, we are eager to establish transformative partnerships and expansive networks to advance our work.

Above all, we express gratitude to the organizations and individuals who have contributed to our cause, guiding us through the growth and successes recorded thus far. Your support has been instrumental in making a positive impact within the criminal justice reform.



## 1. SUPPORT PROGRAM

ith more than 55,000 awaiting trial Inmates across the country, the continuous need for legal assistance cannot be overemphasized and an effective criminal justice system cannot be achieved until accused persons and victims of human right violation have access to legal representation which is a constitutionally guaranteed right. This pressing need for fair dispensation of justice has fueled our legal support program aimed majorly at providing pro bono legal services to indigent and vulnerable persons.

Through the collaboration of our in-house counsels and partnering law firms that believe in our cause, CELSIR's legal support program has successfully provided representation for more than 100 accused individuals. This ongoing initiative reflects our continuous commitment to upholding justice and advocating for the rights of those in need. Through strategic partnerships and the expertise of our legal professionals, we strive to ensure fair representation and support for individuals entangled in legal challenges, contributing to a more equitable and just legal system.



# 2. REHABILITATION PROGRAM

t CELSIR, rehabilitation transcends a mere term; it represents a profound opportunity to empower justice-impacted individuals with skills that enhance their productivity and maximize their positive contributions to society. Recognizing rehabilitation as a vital and effective process, we understand its significance in helping inmates cope with the challenges of incarceration while equipping them with essential psycho-social and life skills. With this ethos guiding our efforts, we have purposefully tailored our interventions to meet the specific needs of our beneficiaries, aligning with our overarching goals. In the past three years, CELSIR has effectively executed the following projects:

#### I) Educational Support Project

In the pursuit of rehabilitation, education emerges as a transformative force for prison inmates. Beyond granting second chances, it nurtures self-respect, counters social disconnection, and fuels aspirations for renewed lives. However, challenges persist ranging from: funding gaps, inadequate learning environments, inaccessible to

qualified teachers, stigma, overcrowding, and limited internet access.

Over the past three years, CELSIR has been a beacon of change. We launched Virtual classes for students preparing to go to higher institutions. This initiative currently runs in 3 correctional facilities - Medium Correctional Center Ikoyi, Medium Correctional Center Kirikiri, and Female Correctional Center Kirikiri in Lagos State. We have provided stationeries, chairs and tables, laptops, projectors, and solar inverters, championing quality education. Our professional teachers connect online, preparing incarcerated individuals for exams. A strategic partnership with XML Consulting enhances our impact.

Looking ahead, our vision is expansive, aiming to extend educational opportunities to correctional centers across Nigeria's six geopolitical zones.

## II. PRISON LIBRARY PROJECT

The inception of our Prison Library Project in 2020 was prompted by firsthand observations of the challenges faced by incarcerated individuals in accessing educational and self-development resources. Recognizing the inadequacy of correctional facility libraries filled with outdated and irrelevant books, CELSIR, with the support of the Ford Foundation, took proactive steps.

The launch of a state-of-the-art 21-user library at the Ikoyi Correctional Centre addressed the lack of reading facilities for incarcerated individuals, exacerbated by the destruction of the only available library during the 2020 #EndSars jailbreak attempt. The library, inclusive of an e-library section, caters to those pursuing undergraduate and postgraduate studies at the National Open University of Nigeria, now serving over 3000 incarcerated persons with a daily usage exceeding 50 individuals.

The initiation of the #DonateaBook campaign Project actively involved communities in supporting incarcerated individuals as a constructive alternative to stigmatization. Over 2000 books, spanning various genres, were collected and distributed across correctional facilities and the Mobile Library Bus, establishing this initiative as a cornerstone of CELSIR's efforts.

In 2022, the Prison Library Program achieved another milestone with the launch of the Mobile Library initiative, a van equipped with versatile book racks covering a range of subjects. Inspired by the success of the stationed library at the Medium Security Custodial Centre, Ikoyi, and the positive feedback received, the need for intervention in other correctional centers propelled the Mobile Library Project.

Since its commissioning, we have visited:

- 3 Medium Security Custodial Centers,
- 1 Maximum Security Custodial Center, and
- 2 Special Correctional Centers for Juveniles within Lagos State Nigeria.





Each center is provided with a thoughtfully curated set of books for a one-month duration before rotation. With approximately 3,000 books, a significant portion of which resulted from our highly successful Book Drive, enhances the literary resources available to these centers.

To enrich our outreach, we organized Storytelling and a Spelling Bee Challenge at the Special Correctional Center for Boys, Oregun, and the Special Correctional Center for Girls, Idi- araba, Lagos.

We envision refurbishing several libraries in the near future and extending our mobile bus rotation to neighboring states.

## III. SKILL ACQUISITION AND SELF-DEVELOPMENT

#### **Creative Writing Workshop Impact:**

In collaboration with Readland Global, our Creative Writing Workshop has profoundly touched the lives of over 80 incarcerated individuals. This transformative program serves as a channel for self-expression, healing, and personal growth. Notable improvements in communication skills, educational enrichment, and reduced recidivism rates highlight the positive influence of the workshop. Continued support for such programs is crucial for a compassionate and effective approach to criminal justice and rehabilitation.

#### Health and Safety Training:

Recognizing heightened health and safety risks within Correctional Centers, CELSIR took a proactive step. Partnering with OSHversity Training and Development Company, we provided unique Health and Safety training. This comprehensive program addressed various hazards within Correctional Institutions. Collaborating with Oshversity, we trained 61 officials in Ikoyi Correctional Center and 65 Incarcerated Individuals in Medium Correction Center, Kirikiri. The focus on sustainable solutions in both the short and long term included essential skills such as First Aid, Fire Safety, Hazard Identification, Risk Assessment, and Mental Health Management.

## A BETTER ME:

#### **An Interactive Motivational Workshop**

A Better Me" is a quarterly interactive event meticulously crafted to instill positive transformation in our beneficiaries. This initiative introduces valuable life skills through the real-life experiences of individuals who have triumphed over societal limitations. We firmly believe that incarcerated individuals seeking positive change should be offered the essential support and skills necessary to make meaningful contributions to society, rather than being perceived as a threat.

Through dynamic elements like open discussions, engaging activities, and motivational sessions, we cultivate personal growth,

resilience, and the rediscovery of purpose among our beneficiaries. Our overarching goal is to provide them with the tools and a positive mindset needed to confront challenges, embrace change, and embark on a journey toward rehabilitation for a successful reintegration into society. Notably, this workshop has been effectively implemented in five correctional centers. Since its inception, the program has featured facilitators of high caliber such as Kunle Adewale, Ifeanyi Mbelu, Bankole Williams, and Nicole Cornway. To date, 700 incarcerated individuals have actively participated in this transformative initiative.

## IV. WELFARE

CELSIR has teamed up in some Prison welfare activities with other organizations. With the support of Integrated Logistics Services, we provided incarcerated individuals with quality and clean clothing. In celebration of International Women's Day, PEP Stores generously contributed clothing items and children's wear to Incarcerated Women. Additionally, we organized a medical outreach at Ikoyi Correctional, with medication donated by "You Matter Foundation," extending essential healthcare support to those in need.





# 3. RE-ENTRY SUPPORT

n Nigeria, the persistent stigma faced by formerly incarcerated individuals poses a significant challenge to their reintegration into society, and limited access to opportunities often lead to higher chances of recidivism. In addressing these barriers, CELSIR has implemented various strategies to facilitate successful integration.

#### i) Employment Preparation

In our commitment to empowering formerly incarcerated individuals, CELSIR actively engages with formerly Incarcerated Individuals to prepare professional resumes (Cvs). Through this, we pave the way for employment opportunities and training programs, aiming to enhance their prospects and foster self-sufficiency.

#### li) Internship Opportunities

Over the past few years, CELSIR has offered internship opportunities within our organization. By extending a helping hand to formerly incarcerated individuals, we equip them with valuable skills, placing them in a favorable position within the competitive job market. Notably, some have been connected to fellowship opportunities, with our lead ambassador successfully admitted into the prestigious Global Freedom Fellowship.



#### THE SAFE HOUSE

In November 2023, the Centre for Legal Support and Inmate Rehabilitation (CELSIR), in partnership with "A New Way of Life," proudly launched the first of its kind Safe House (Half Way Home), for formerly incarcerated women in Nigeria.

Over the last three years, CELSIR has continued to emerge as a force, fully committed to the rehabilitation of incarcerated individuals and championing programs aimed at facilitating their successful reintegration into society. Our objective is to fast-track their self-reliance and help them become valuable members of the community.

The newly established Safe House, "The Ruby House," drew inspiration from the rich symbolism of the ruby color, signifying compassion, strength, and courage. The Ruby House stands as a shelter for formerly incarcerated women, offering them temporary protection while they experience the social reintegration process. Here, they are

equipped with the essential skills and support needed to foster independence and pave the way for a brighter and more empowered future as they navigate their path to full social reintegration.

The Ruby Safe House, designed to accommodate 15 residents with comfort, adopts a holistic approach to the rehabilitation of formerly incarcerated women. The facility features specialized areas such as a skills room, a library, and an individual counseling space, fostering an environment conducive to comprehensive recovery. Moreover, a room is allocated to guarantee the privacy of nursing mothers and pregnant women, as well as to recognize and cater to their specific needs. This thoughtful design ensures that the Safe House is not just a residence but a supportive and tailored environment for the diverse needs of its residents.

























## **CELSIR AMBASSADORS**

The CELSIR Ambassadors constitute an exclusive community comprising individuals who have experienced incarceration but have since regained their freedom. 
### **FINANCIALS**



- 1. **Educational Support:** Donation of educational materials and tutors' stipend to facilitate virtual classes.
- 2. **Prison Library:** Cost of equipping the Ikoyi Medium Security Custodial Center Library and purchasing the Mobile Library.
- 3. **Skill Acquisition:** Expenses incurred for capacity building (trainings) in Correctional Centers
- 4. **Welfare:** Donations made for well-being of incarcerated and formerly incarcerated individuals.
- 5. **Reentry Support:** Reintegration of formerly incarcerated individuals into the Society.

In the coming years, we are taking strategic steps to expand our reach by offering support services to correctional centers across the six geopolitical zones of Nigeria. Here is a brief rundown of our strategic focus:

#### **Educational Support:**

CELSIR will be collaborating with technology partners to provide access to online courses and other educational resources. With adequate funding, we will be extending our virtual classes to other correctional centers while maintaining the existing ones. We also plan to enrol more students for the General Certificate Examinations.

#### Juvenile Justice Reform:

We hope to extend our services to more juvenile centers with a strong emphasis on rehabilitation and education instead of punitive measures. We will advocate for reforms addressing the root causes of juvenile delinquency, such as poverty, trauma, or limited access to education.

#### Reentry Support:

Having established the first Safe House in Nigeria, we will intensify our effort in reentry support by providing housing, job and empowerment opportunities, education, mental health services, and other essential support systems for successful reintegration. We will collaborate with the formerly incarcerated individuals, their families, grassroots bodies, and concerned stakeholders to ensure a comprehensive and inclusive approach guided by firsthand experiences and expertise.

#### Advocacy for the rights of justice-impacted individuals:

CELSIR will be championing more advocacies in favour of restorative justice practices with a focus on healing, accountability, and rehabilitation rather than strict punitive measures.

#### Building Partnerships with relevant Stakeholders:

We are also looking to establish robust partnerships with government agencies, corporate organizations, and key players in the Nigerian criminal justice system.

We are extending the Mobile Library Initiative to more correctional centers beyond Lagos. Our prison library project is set to include refurbishment of existing libraries while simultaneously equipping the Mobile Library van with more book collections, catering to diverse subjects and interests. Our expansion initiative will also promote more peer-to-peer learning through book clubs in correctional centers in Nigeria.



The overarching goal in the long term is to promote seamless social reintegration and acceptance of formerly incarcerated individuals by raising public awareness about their challenges and dispelling misconceptions as well as stigmas surrounding incarceration.
